SANDRA BROWN CONTINUES TO AMAZE

The amazing **Sandra Brown (C36)** has been pounding the pavement yet again with a 3 more hundreds to take her tally to 11 for the year.

Firstly, back to September when Sandra and husband Richard, along with **Sue Clements (C35)** all completed the annual Nijmegen to Rotterdam 160kms/100 miles. It is not a race but is, rather, a walk together, with a view to complete the 160km in 29 hours. They all did the deed! Sandra commented:

This was my 7th completion, Sue's 8th, and Richard's first! It was great that he was able to experience this fantastic walk across Holland's varied landscapes in the excellent company of many Centurions and other friends, and he greatly enjoyed it too.

Next to the October for the Goring on Thames 100 Miles which she walked in what turned out to be dreadful conditions

A couple of weeks ago I did the Centurion Running Autumn cross country 100: 4x25 miles [Thames Path long distance trail east and west, Ridgeway long distance trail north and south] based in the pretty and historic village of Goring on Thames. I did this event 3 years ago in glorious autumn weather. This year I have experienced some very odd weather in my events. The Bourges and Chateau Thierry 24h walks in the Spring both had profoundly cold weather ["the Beast from the East" brought snow to all Europe including CT that weekend.] The Essex 100 in July was about the hottest weekend of the year and only 4 completed the full 100 miles. Then the August Centurions 100 in the IOM saw us catch the tail end of a hurricane, with strong winds and heavy rain. Something similar happened around Goring: Saturday was hot and humid, bringing its own issues, then the rain and winds started about midnight and continued into Sunday, so the last section of the Thames Path felt at times like wading in the River Thames. Anyway, I walked all the way and finished very happily in 26.00.42, two hours within the cut off. That makes 196 events of 100 miles or more, and is the 80th 100 miles.

Finally, to November when she and Kathy Crilley competed in the Monaco ‘No Finish Line’ 24 Hour. Over to Sandra again:

Last weekend Kathy Crilley and I again enjoyed joining other athletes and members of the local community in walking/running in the Monaco “No Finish Line” 24h, to raise funds for children’s charities. The banks put up 1 euro for each km completed. The weather was again mild and dry, but with strong winds. To my surprise, I finished first lady and 4th individual overall with 170.095 kms. Kathy completed 125.920 kms. This is an event with a great heart and I suspect we’ll be back!

For the record, that makes 11 hundreds this year for Sandra (see below) and brings her grand tally to 197. Gosh, it seems only a couple of years ago that Sandra hit the 100 mark. And now she is quickly closing on 200.

This race marked her 10th selection / 9th participation in a World Championship and she produced the goods once again, helping the Australian women's team to second overall. - It was 32C, hot and humid and warm at night. Oppressive sums it up.

- Nikki Wynd collapsed in the evening and was non coherent. She had four bags of IV fluids. When the medics finally released her she refused to go back to the hotel, and remained with the team for the duration
- Everyone was there to run for the team, and believe me they all gave it 200% and then some. It was incredible to see runners push It as far as they possibly could, they all did without exception. Amazing to witness such an incredible team spirit in what is often such an individual sport.

UPDATE ON THE 2019 COBURG 24 HOUR CARNIVAL

In late October, when the Australian Ultra Runners Assn (AURA) announced the events selected to host the AURA Australian Championships for 2019, the Coburg 24 Hour Carnival was amongst them. The Aust Champs list reads

That means we will be hosting the Australian 24 Hour Track Running Championships alongside our Centurion qualifier. Of course, the runners and walkers will be in different lanes so no issues there.

Even more reason to come to Coburg next year as either a walker or a runner - not that you need a reason!

Arie and Gertrude competed last year and are back for another attempt at that elusive badge. Colin (fresh from his successful walk last year) is back again in 2019, along with regulars Peter and Dawn. We will also welcome Dutch walker Martin Vos, already a double centurion (British and Continental).

LE GRAND PRIX DE LA VOIE SACRÉE, BAR LE DUC TO VERDUN, FRANCE, SUNDAY 11 NOVEMBER

If you ever find yourself in France on Armistice Day (11th November), then I have just the walking race for you. November 11th is a public holiday in France because of course it marks the end of the First World War (this year was the 100th anniversary). It also sees the annual staging of the Grand Prix de la voie Sacrée which is a 57.7km race between Bar le Duc and Verdun. The race has been held each year since 1980. In even years, it goes from Bar le Duc to Verdun and in odd years, it goes from Verdun to Bar le Duc.

The road used is a memorial road. It is the only road in France who don't have number, it's only named "La Voie Sacrée". It was along this road that some one million soldiers travelled to the famous Battle of Verdun in 1916. Most of them never came back. Memorial milestones, each with a soldier's helmet on it, are placed every kilometre.

Emmanuel Tardi was there this year to lend support and to take photos. There were 23 starters this year for the 9AM start, with the temperature around 12°C, very good for walkers. By the 10km mark, the lead group had whittled to **Florian Letourneau, Mathieu Olivares, Christer Svensson** (the 2015 winner), **Christophe Erard** (the 2016 winner) and **Gérard Guétat** (the 2017 winner). By the 21km mark, the pack had been reduced to Guétat, Olivares and Svensson, with Letourneau 500m further back. At this point, Letourneau changed gear, catching the leaders by 30km and then going on to win in 5:35:45, just over 6 minutes ahead of Gerard Guetat (5:41:36). **Zbigniew Klapa**, one of the Paris-Colmar legends with 5 victories in the 1990s, finished 6th with 6:11:37. In the women's race, **Dora Jakob-Brière** from Switzerland won easily with 6:32:41, her 5th win.

The ancillary events of 21.5km were won by **Philippe Bibet and Sonia Demon**. Now aged 90 years, **Robert Schouckens**, the winner of the 1977 Paris-Strasbourg, finished the race with time of 3:22, after passing the 20km mark in 3:11.

LES 8 HEURES D' ETAMPES-SUR-MARNE, ETAMPES-SUR-MARNE, FRANCE, 25 NOVEMBER

Emmanuel Tardi was in Etampes sur Marne, 100km east of Paris, last for their annual 8 hours race last Sunday. As always, it was well supported, with about 60 walkers who had come to compete in the streets of this small village of 1200 people. The lap was 2.5km long and included a very hard hill of 400m length, (32m height rise). The start was at 8AM, under a small but very cold rain, conditions which stayed for the full day.

Florian Letourneau led from start to finish in the men's 8 Hour race, winning with 75.0km, ahead of **Fabian Deparday** and **Mathieu Olivares**, both on 70km. **Christine Lepage** led the women's 8 Hour race early, before **Emilie Bizard** caught her, going on to win with 65.0km. Lepage held on for second place with 62.5km. The ancilliary 10km race was won by **David Stefannely**.

After the disappointment of the Corcieux race on October 28th, when he was stopped after 44km in his attempt to beat the M80 50km world best, **Alexis Jordana** was here for another attempt. He had special authorization and don't need to finish the race to have his 50km time ratified. He walked very evenly, beating the world best by more than 13 minutes with a time of **6:28:38**. Alexis's 50m splits were 36'59, 37'52, 38'23, 38'26, 39'10, 39'46, 38'43, 39'11, 39'07 and 40'51.

Alexis was born on 10th Feb 1937 and began racewalking in 1954 as a junior. He finished 10th in the 1959 20km French Championship and 12th in 1961 (1:54:14). His first 50km was, as far as Emmanuel knows, was on 7th July 1963 in Cherbourg, when he finished with a time of 5:11:22. In Masters events, he has won 19 medals (including 5 golds) at World Championship level, starting with Melbourne in 1987 when he was 3rd in the M50 5000m (23:48), and 20 medals (2 golds) at European Championship level, starting with 1982.

At this time, I am normally watching the Coast to Kosci unfold via my computer. This iconic race of 240km travels from the NSW south coast to the top of Mt Kosciuzko, Australia's highest peak. It was first held in 2004 and is now an

integral part of our Australian ultra calendar. It has even seen a walker participating, with **Peter Bennett (C24)** finishing in both 2011 and 2012. Sadly, it is no more, after being cancelled last month. The ever increasing approvals roundabout had become too much for race organiser Paul Every.
