You can expect the weather to be better than in September but not quite as good as that in November.

### 43<sup>RD</sup> GRAND PRIX DE LA VOIE SACRÉE, VERDUN TO BAR LE DUC, FRANCE, SAT 11 NOV 2023

Emmanuel Tardi reports on a very special commemorative fixture on the French walking calendar:

November 11th is a public holiday in France because it marks the end of the First World War. Various walking races have been organised on this date but the best known and most long lasting is the Grand Prix de la Voie Sacrée which is a race between Bar le Duc and Verdun. Held each year since 1980, the race goes from Bar le Duc to Verdun in even years and from Verdun to Bar le Duc in odd years.

The road used is a special memorial road named La Voie Sacrée (The Sacred Way). It was along this road that some one million soldiers travelled to the famous Battle of Verdun in 1916. Most of them never came back. Memorial milestones, each with a soldier's helmet on it, are placed every kilometre.

Only a few walkers were on the start line at 9am for the start of the 55.1km race, which Florian Letourneau won for the 4<sup>th</sup> time (previous wins in 2018, 2019, 2022). He led the race the whole way, but was accompanied by Laura De Bontin for the first kilometre. Laura was in the French team in 2006 and was born in Verdun. It was one of her goals to finish this race and she did indeed, coming second overall!

An ancillary event was a 21.5km between Erize and Bar le Duc, and this was won by Valérie Boban.

## 8 HEURES D'ETAMPES SUR MARNE 2023, ETAMPES-SUR-MARNE, FRA, SUNDAY NOV 26, 2023

Thanks again to Emmanuel Tardi who spent Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> November in the small town (1500m people) of Etampes-sur-Marne, 100km east of Paris, at the 22<sup>nd</sup> 8 Heures d'Etampes-sur-Marne.

Walkers competed over a 2.5km loop for the first 7 hours and then over a 500m loop in the final hour. It was a tough loop, with a 420m hill that rose 34 metres (that equates to a 9% gradient). The weather was very cold for the 8AM start, with the temperature around -2°C, but it did warm a little as the day progressed.

In the men's walk, **Florian Letourneau** led from start to finish, passing the 50km mark in 4:55 before slowing to his final winning distance of 76.803km. The battle was for second place was fierce, with the next 3 walkers always within a couple of minutes of each other. It was **Philippe Morel** who eventually took silver, just ahead of **Alain Malfondet** and **Jacques Arnault.** In the women's walk, **Veronique Bessot** was a convincing winner with a distance of 67.791 km. Emmanuel was one of 10 competitors who had a stroll around in the ancilliary 10km walk event.

Here are our nominations for 2023, in date order, as proposed by our Executive:



#### Joffrid Mackett (C82) - a new Australian 48H Walk record of 294.973km

Walking in the Sri Chinmoy 48 Hour Carnival in Canberra on the weekend of 25-26 March 2023, Joffrid powered through the first 100 miles in a time of 23:47:02, his second centurion walk and only slightly slower than he walked to qualify as a centurion in this same event last year. He then powered through the second 24 Hour period with barely a stop, working his way up through the field of runners to finish second overall (and first male) in the 48 Hour Australian Championship with a distance of 294.973km, bettering the Australian 48 Hour Walk Open Record by 11km (obviously also setting a new Australian M50 48H Walk record into the bargain) and claiming the Male Australian 48 Hour Run Championship. The only runner who finished ahead of him was American Camille Herron who set a new Women's 48 Hour World Record of 435.336km. No shame in being beaten by that sort of performance!



# Arie Kandelaars (C85) - Australian Centurion Number 85 on his fourth attempt

Dutch walker Arie Kandelaars had previously tried for his Australian Centurion badge in 2018, 2019 and 2022, falling short on all 3 occasions. He toed the start line once again in our annual qualifier at the Coburg 24 Hour Carnival on the weekend of 15-16 April 2023. Conditions were horrendous, with hours upon hours of torrential rain, but Arie never missed a beat. becoming Australian Centurion C85 with his 100 mile time of 23:28:07. Arie already had 5 Centurion badges to his credit: African (2016, 23:52:00), English (2017, 23:49:27), NZ (2017, 23:36:29), USA (2018, 23:52:14) and Continental (2021, 23:21:20). Finally an Australian Centurion badge to take his tally to six. Understandably, this performance won him the Jim Gleeson Trophy for the most meritorious performance of the day.



# Michelle Thompson (C58) - a triumphant return at Coburg with another centurion finish

Arie was one of 3 walkers to complete 100 miles at Coburg this year, the others being Michelle Thompson (C58) with a time of 22:16:55 and David Billett (C50) with a time of 23:05:12. Michelle set the pace right from the start and was never headed. A former Coburg 24H Walk and 24H Run winner and Australian walk record holder, Michelle was in a class of her own, striding confidently through to reach her 100 mile mark in 22:16.55. That included about 30 minutes off the track helping look after one of the runners after he collapsed, but her lead was significant and no one was going to catch her. She retired at that point, task accomplished. It was her seventh centurion walk but her first one since 2016, after which she effectively retired. What a comeback!



#### Sabina Hamaty - new Australian 500km and 6 Days Records

Following on from her 200km and 48 hour walk records in June in Sydney, Sabina Hamaty was back in in action in early October in the Australian 6 Day Championship in Adelaide and eyeing more records. The first two days in particular were very tough with daytime temperatures of 32C on Day 1 and 30C on Day 2, along with hot blustery northerly winds. Then just to add to the mix, a huge low front came through that night, with thunder, lightning, rain and high winds. There were electrical blackouts all over Adelaide but luckily the race was spared that additional angst, but conditions were still scary. Yes, it eventually cleared and the weather improved for the final days but it made what is already a very tough event even tougher.

It was another successful outing for Sabina as she set new Australian women's Open and W50 500km Walk (5D:16:17:31) and 6 Day Walk (537.513km) records. Deborah DeWilliams had held the Australian 6 Day Walk record with 448.170km, done at Colac in 2004, Sabina bettered that distance by a whopping 89km! Sabina now holds the Australian walk records for 200km, 500km, 48 Hours and 6 Days. An impressive start to her walking career!

I will be separately emailing all our Australian centurion members for voting purposes and will be announcing the winner at our AGM in January 2024.
